SUBJECT: Board of Corrections Report for January, 2023

Enclosed you will find the monthly report.

• **Enclosure 1 (Administrative Services):**

- After the seventh month of the fiscal year we are \$3,628,448 under budget. We have some major renovation and safety projects which have gotten underway and we expect the costs of those projects to reduce that surplus in the coming months.
- \$832,736 was spent on overtime costs in January, up from the previous month. We anticipate a decrease in overtime costs as staffing improves.

• **Enclosure 2 (Community Corrections /Reentry Services):**

- The Sanction Center and Transitional Discharge Center placed a total of 20 individuals in Community Corrections and saved a combined 94 bed days
- Work Release
 - Admitted 30 individuals
- House Arrest
 - House Arrest admitted 56 individuals
- Reentry Assistance Program (RAP)
 - RAP admitted 29 individuals
- Reentry Services/Therapeutic Communities
 - 62 individuals were admitted to therapeutic community housing units
 - Three individuals achieved a GED
- Pre-trial Services
 - Full integration of data systems is in progress for the revised Pretrial Release supervision program.
 - 84 Individuals were placed on Pretrial Release
 - 617 Individuals were supervised on Pretrial Release
 - 513 Individuals participated in 24/7 Sobriety
 - 104 Individuals were supervised via GPS monitors

- We able to track law library usage on the inmate tablet system. The number of individuals utilizing law library resources is significantly higher than when we offered a law library access in a classroom setting.

- **Enclosure 3 (ACA, NCCHC, PREA - Compliance)**
 - Regular annual documentation is being collected for all compliance processes. We are entering the final year of our ACA audit cycle. Re-accreditation audits for the Jail and Community Corrections will occur in the fall of 2023.
 - We received our final reports from our Prison Rape Elimination Act Audit in January and both the jail and community corrections are in full compliance.

- **Enclosure 4 (Personnel)**
 - Five officers below the rank of Sergeant left employment in January. This includes one retirement and two officers who did not complete successfully training.
 - Eight officers began a four week academy training on January 9th and graduated on February 3rd.
 - Sixteen officers began a five week academy training on January 27th and will graduate on March 3rd.
 - Thirty-seven officers are expected to begin a six week academy training on February 27th. This class, the largest in memory, will be working housing units and significantly reducing our overtime costs beginning in mid-April after they have completed field training.
 - We are discontinuing the accelerated training academy with overlapping classes beginning with the February 27th academy to assure that each new officer in this large class receives high quality training and demonstrates the required skills to safely begin their service to Douglas County.
 - Seven officers graduated from the training the training academy on January 6th.
 - We continue to see large increases in our applicant pool since the changes to the contract with the FOP, Lodge 8 took effect. We began a marketing campaign using social and local mainstream media outlets including TV, radio, and print ads in publications, including those who traditionally appeal to our minority communities.
 - We have increased our Correctional Officer staffing from 80.5% to 86.5% in one month.
 - Numerous officers were recognized for meritorious service.

 - Inmates were sent out sixteen times for emergent medical care. Six of those were by 911. There were four hospital admissions, which resulted in thirteen days of hospitalization.
 - There were 31 offsite specialty medical appointments.
 - Dr. John Winters was hired as Medical Director for Wellpath and Rebecca Swearingen, RN was hired as Health Services Administrator for Wellpath. Both began their duties in January.
 - Covid vaccine clinics continue to be offered regularly to the incarcerated population.

 - 48.2% of our population was diagnosed with a mental illness, the highest percentage recorded.
- **Other noteworthy items**
 - Our safety enhancement project continues with safety netting installed in four housing units. Top bunk replacement will begin in February. When concluded, all housing units with a top tier will have safety netting installed. Most of the top bunks in celled housing units will be replaced with improved models that we believe will also improve inmate safety. This project will continue throughout much of the balance of 2023.
 - An Intensive Outpatient Treatment program (IOP) for individuals with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders will begin in late February in the jail. This program is modeled after our successful IOP program that has operated in Community Corrections for several years. This program, like the original version in Community Corrections is a joint partnership between DCDC and the Douglas County Community Health Center. It will be staffed by employees from CHMC and is fully funded for at least the next three years with a \$1,000,000 Second Chance Act grant which was awarded just before the pandemic began.
 - Preparation activities for our role as the host agency for the 2023 American Jail Association National Conference and Jail Expo are ramping up. The conference will be held at the CHI Health Convention Center May 20-24.



BACKGROUND: Having completed the seventh month (January, 2023) of the budget year July 2022-June 2023, the following is a summary of our budget and staffing:


Staffing:


Correctional Officer Staffing Fiscal Years 2022- 2023







The following graph shows the total Bonds/Fines and Costs collected for incarcerated individuals:







Number of Individuals Released to Pretrial Supervision



Total Number of Individuals Supervised on Pretrial Release




Number of Individuals Supervised by Supervision Level



Total Number of Cases Supervised by Race





Number of Individuals on Pretrial Release GPS




Number of individuals who were placed on GPS each month










BACKGROUND: We continue to collect census data.

DISCUSSION: This month the average population has increased and is consistent with prior year trends. The average population for the month was 1084. Our low was 1058 on the 13th. With a high of 1111 on the 9th. U.S. Marshal Population increased this month. Felony pre-trial population increased and the percentage of the population increased. The female population increased this month and is consistent with prior year trends. The high female population was 184 on the 9th. The low was 156 on the 16th and 17th. Total admissions for the month were 1332 and 1315 were released from custody. Custodial Sanction days served this month was 99 bed days.





JAN 23 RACE DEMOGRAPHICS




JAN 23 % AGE DEMOGRAPHICS


Withdrawal Protocols


